### Tokyo to Host US Trade Show on Emergency Preparedness and Disaster Relief

On February 13-14, 1997, Commercial Service Tokyo will hold its first trade show for U.S. companies and exporters of products and services in fields related to emergency preparedness and disaster relief. The show, entitled "U.S. Emergency Preparedness and Disaster Relief 1997," will be held at the U.S. Trade Center in Tokyo and is open to all U.S. companies with products and services applicable to preparing for, surviving, and restoring normal conditions following emergencies and natural disasters including earthquakes, typhoons, and fires.

Japan has been fraught with emergencies over the last two years (including the major earthquake in Kobe, the subway gas attacks, and a Hokkaido tunnel collapse) that have tested not only the resolve of the Japanese, but also the government's ability to respond and cope with unforeseen events. The importance of risk and crisis management has come to the surface.

Public officials from across Japan as well as private business representatives will be attending the trade show to learn how we cope in the U.S. and what kinds of products and services we offer to make preparation and response to emergencies and disasters prompt and worthwhile. U.S. companies in this field are seen as experts and innovators. ## Learning from Earthquakes

### 6.4 Quake Kills 11 in Peru

A magnitude 6.4 earthquake centered in the Pacific Ocean about 80 miles west of the resort town of Nazca, Peru (pop. 25,000), brought devastation to that community and was felt as far away as the capital city of Lima, about 235 miles to the north. Early estimates put the number of dead at 11 with many hundreds injured. Nazca's mayor estimated that 95 percent of the adobe and brick homes in his town were damaged. Electricity and phone service was disrupted.

The quake also caused damage to Ica, a city of 160,000 people 160 miles southeast of the capital. The Agriculture Ministry building was reported to be damaged, as was the Cathedral of Ica, another church and several public buildings. Look for details in next month's *Newsletter*.

These meetings offer a chance to sit down with a small group of colleagues with similar interests and bat ideas around in an informal setting.

Keep an eye open for the program and registration materials which will be mailed soon. This year's meeting is in Austin, Texas, beginning on the evening of Wednesday, February 12, and concluding on Saturday afternoon, February 15. The Organizing Committee, chaired by Sharon Wood, has put together an outstanding program. If you've never been to an EERI Annual Meeting, this is the year to begin coming.
